Workshop Competition
Season 1914

The Committee have pleasure in announcing their 1st Annual Workshop Cricket Competition which commences on May 26th. They hope that all workshops & factories in Brighouse and district will give the scheme consideration and if possible enter a team for the competition. The rules for the competition will be as follows

- 1 The competition shall be ruled and governed by the following sub committee of the Brighouse Cricket Club
- 2 The matches shall be played on the Cup the principle the teams retiring from the competition when defeated
- 3 Each team shall consist of 11 players and may include any person who is an employee or member of the respective organization at the beginning of the competition
- 4 No team shall include any person who has played in the 1st or 2nd XI^s of the following Leagues Yorkshire Council Bradford Huddersfield Spenn Valley Leeds Halifax and Tradesmens League during season 1914
- 5 Each match shall be played on the ground of the Brighouse Cricket Club and at the time and date

- arranged by the Committee Tackling provided by the Club but any club may provide their own if desirous
- 6 All umpires shall be appointed by the Committee.
 - 7 Each team shall bat one hour unless disposed of in less time and the team scoring the most runs in that time shall be the winners irrespective of how many are out or have still to bat. The Committee reserve the power to alter the time of play.
 - 8 No team shall play a man unless he be a bonafide employee of their workshops or factory.
 - 9 All applications for admission to the competition to be addressed to the Secretary before May 22nd accompanied by a full list of players and an entrance fee of 2/6 for registration which will be returned in the event of the Committee deciding not to admit the club which right the Committee reserve.
 - 10 The full draw for the competition will be drawn on May 25th and each club will be notified by post.
 - 11 Any club having any objection to make regarding teams or players must forward such objection to the Secretary along with a fee of 2/6 within 24 hours of finish of match. Only in the event of the objection being upheld by the Committee will the deposit be returned.
 - 12 Gold medals for the winners of the competition and the medals for the runners up will be on view during the competition and 2 Special Prizes will be given viz:- one for the highest individual score and one for the record Bowling performance during the competition (not less than 5 wickets to count).
 - 13 Each player shall pay an admission fee of 1^d for each and every match in which he takes part.
 - 14 The admission fee to the ground for spectators shall be a 1^d to all matches up to Semi Final and Final.
 - 15 No Practice before a match.
