Ton-up two match the occasion

TWO players who have been familiar figures around the local cricket scene for 50 years - Gordon Scott and Tracy Pollard - will mark their sporting careers with a special match at Southowram CC on Sunday (10).

Both are still involved at the club, Gordon as a player for the seconds and under 12s coach and Tracy as a player for the thirds on Sundays, as well as umpiring in the Halifax League on Saturdays.

The pair will captain sides in a 45-overs-per-side contest for the Millennium Challenge Cup and the match will be preceded at 11.0 by a buffet and followed by a disco.

The teams are drawn from players Scott and Pollard have teamed up with during their careers.

Scott, who started in a 10-year-old for Siddal Under 10s, has had two spells at Grestland and Barkisland and also played for Copley and his current club in the Halifax League. The early order batsman, who also bowls off breaks, has also played for Elland and Primrose Hill in the Huddersfield League and Halifax in the Yorkshire League.

He has played in three Parish Cup finals and five Sykes Cup finals, collecting five winner's medals. He also has a Parish Cup final batting average of 232, having made scores of 78 not out, 79 not out (over three nights) and 86.

Scott, who lives at Heaton, Bradford and is site manager at Russell Hall

Primary School, Queensbury, has topped the Halifax League batting averages four times and also won the Section B prize in the Huddersfield League. He is a grade two coach.

Opening batsman Pollard, who was 66 in April, has had three clubs. He spent 19 years with the old Dean Clough side who later became Crossleys and played at Mason Green. When Crossleys lost their ground he spent 11 years at Triangle before answering the call from his nephew Mick to join Halifax League new boys Southowram 10 years ago.

He has played in five Parish Cup finals, winning once, and is also well known in amateur soccer circles as a former sweeper at Wheatley Wells, a referee for 15 years and a key figure behind Boothtown Juniors AFC.

A former Calderdale Council player who retired four years ago, he lives at Chiremsant.

Scott's team will include his brother David while Pollard has called on Mick and his son Wayne for the Elland Trophy and Engraving Centre-sponsored contest, which Pollard promises will be a serious match.

VILLAGE CRICKET CLUB OPENS NEW INNINGS

Batting into next century

VISITORS to Southwram will be well and truly bowled over this season thanks to a transformation which is set to take the village cricket club into the 21st century.

Renovations over recent years have knocked the archaic Ashday Lane ground for six — but new seating, a new scorebox and an improved wicket have already scored highly with regulars and rivals.

Now the costly improvements are set to be capped next month with the completion of a new £30,000 pavilion.

The single-storey building — complete with changing rooms, showers, tea hall and bar — is a far cry from an old pavilion which did not even have running water.

Southwram Cricket Club committee chairman Mr Dave Hirst said the old pavilion leaned, leaked, and had been long past its sell-by-date!

"The club had bought the old shed for £5 from Barkisland Cricket Club in 1981 when it first came to Ashday Lane and was still in the Halifax Amateur Association," he said.

"It had originally been taken to Barkisland from an old cricket club in Southwram more than 60 years ago on the back of a horse-drawn cart and it was not in a very good state at all."

Mr Hirst said when the club were elected to the Halifax Parish League's second division in 1988 it had been decided that extensive improvements were needed to update the ground — with the pavilion a priority.

Fund-raising was stepped up, wicket improvements made, a £6,000 new scorebox and store built — replacing an old hamburger stall bought from Halifax Town Football Club as a score-

box in 1982 — and new ground seating installed.

But with an estimated £30,000 needed for a new pavilion, the club — which was formed as a team for the Cock and Bottle pub in Southwram in 1977 — batted on with their leaning landmark until last year.

Mr Hirst said the committee decision to replace the pavilion was taken at the end of last season after the offer of stone to build a new one from Southwram firm Marshalls.

The club successfully applied for grants totalling £16,000 from the Yorkshire and Humberside Sports Council and Calderdale Council's Fair Shares committee. Planning permission for the new building was granted last June.

The old pavilion, which was built for the disbanded St Anne's Church Cricket Club in the village, was put to the torch last December.

"For many people it was sad to see it go — but not for me. It was virtually falling down and if we had not have done something soon it would have come down on our heads," said Mr Hirst.

But almost as soon as construction got under way workers — including many committee members and players who were helping out on the project in their spare time — hit a sticky wicket.

The ground, a former quarry and council tip, was found to have a problem with underground methane gas and a special base had to be made before building work could start on the new pavilion.

The hitch put work back at least a month and the club was left with a £3,000 bill it had not planned for.

But first team captain Mr Mick Pollard said the village responded magnificently to the pavilion appeal.

"The support we have had from the pubs, clubs and local business in the village has been great and we have raised £3,000 very quickly. We are still about £10,000 short but hopefully this will come in with further fund-raising and another grant," he said.

"At the end of the day we will have some of the best facilities around Calderdale, should be able to attract some of the best

players around the district and get into the first division. It will be the start of a new era."

The new pavilion is due for completion next month ready for the start of the Parish League season at the end of April.

It is hoped to organise a knock-

out contest involving teams from all over Yorkshire as part of the official opening celebrations.

A signing-on night will be held on Thursday at Southwram Social Club for players for the club's first, second, Sunday and junior teams and more fund-raising

events will take place next month including and race night at the Liberal Club on 1st
