

Now for another Central League tournament. First the Holden Cup and now the Tinker Cup. Will it be the League championship next season? Cartworth Moor people are hoping so, and are working that way for it, too. The Cartworth Moor eleven, as is well known, won the Holden Cup last season, and on Saturday they carried off the Tinker Cup, which in 1929 and in 1933 was won by Cumberworth United, in 1930 by Lepton Highlanders, in 1931 and last season by Skelmanthorpe. This time Cartworth Moor were pitted against the Scholes representatives, who have had a variable season. They started finely by winning three matches off the reel, and since then the Scholes second eleven have met with a series of reverses. The match took place at Holme Bridge. It was marked by a fine bowling performance on the part of A. Kaye, of the Cartworth Moor side, who took six wickets for 20 runs. This came as a sort of surprise to the Scholes crew. A. Kaye has not hitherto been regarded as a specialist in the bowling line, and has not often been called upon. Somebody seems to have forgotten that he captured seven Thurstonland wickets for 17 runs on June 8th, and before that he bagged seven Nortonthorpe wickets for 19 runs.
