











Wesleyans develop £340,000 facilities

ALMONDBURY Wesleyans are pressing ahead with their massive investment programme to re-develop their Kaye Lane ground, which they now hope will be ready by the end of March and in time for the 2002 season.

Wesleyans' chairman Mark Binns, who heads the sub-committee responsible for the re-development said: "We have already had the field levelled out and re-seeded at a cost of £30,000, and now work has started on building a new pavilion.

"In total we are looking at a £340,000 investment which has been funded essentially by Sport England, who have given us £252,000, along with £45,000 from Kirklees Council, which was largely thanks to the efforts of deputy leader, Clr John Smithson."

The club have also received further financial support from the Huddersfield Common Good Trust, with the balance being provided by their own fund-raising efforts.

Wesleyans now have a membership of upwards of 200, 140 of whom are below the age of 18, and many are from outside the village.

The club cater for every form of cricket, with successful junior teams, women, disabled and ethnic minorities all being represented.

A warm welcome to the formal opening of the recently re-developed Cricket Ground at Almondbury Wesleyan CC. Today is one of the most important days in the club's 82 year history as we celebrate the £340,000 investment in cricket and the community which has provided one of the finest venues for cricket in the town.

Some of you may be visiting us for the first time, but many are long standing members & friends of "The Wes" who have played your part in the creation of this facility and the hugely successful cricket development programmes it supports.

Our club's 140 strong membership includes 100 young cricketers from all backgrounds and cultures who play and learn cricket through Kwik Cricket sessions up to 11 years & then enter our 4 junior squads at under 13, 15 & 17 levels. Five team trophies won in the last 2 years, together with a number of individual achievements and representations at all age levels has made our cricket programmes some of the most successful in the town & the envy of more "professional" and bigger clubs. Well done to all players, managers and coaches - a real winning team.

Today is the culmination of 6 years of vision & planning followed by 2 1/2 years of hard-work, but couldn't have been achieved without the contribution & dedication of many club members, in particular the 7 man Steering Committee who, together with our professional advisors, contractors & suppliers, have managed the project through to its completion.

A big thank you also goes to our funders, sponsors & others that have contributed in time & kind - we are most grateful. 275 sponsored bricks adorn our club-room wall with the names of the people built into the pavilion for evermore. KAYE LANE REDEVELOPMENT HOW IT ALL HAPPENED

In 1986 we opened our new tea room, where for the first time, players and spectators could sit down inside for refreshments. In 1991 our new Portakabin dressing rooms had a plumbed in toilet and for the first time we were able to provide for the convenience of our ladies! These events in the context of our club's history were major developments, achieved as cheaply as possible, with hard earned resources from our Building Fund which was always being depleted. Knowing our club was formed in 1920 with a field made suitable for cricket by dedicated members after the 1st world war and that as an amateur organisation it had struggled for years to raise money to keep going, would anyone then have even dreamed of the current situation at Kaye Lane?

The growing realisation that with no junior teams and an ageing playing membership the club's future was insecure was addressed in 1996. Under the guidance of the inspirational John Cowan we launched our Thursday evening Kwik-Cricket sessions for youngsters from 5 - 12 years old. Soon children were coming from all over the district and attendance was often as high as 80. Indeed in 1999 concern was raised in committee whether we could cope with the numbers. However the evenings are still well supported by young people keen to enjoy learning cricketing skills.

1997 saw the formation of our first U13 league team, to be followed by an U15 squad and U17's in 2000. Last season, we were able to field a second U13 team including 2 girls and at the end of season were able to congratulate our U13s and U17s of being champions of their respective sections.

Thanks to many players taking coaching courses we now have a structure in place which caters for all youngsters, regardless of ability from the age of 5 to the end of their cricketing careers.

A development sub-committee had been considering the possibilities of greatly improving our facilities during 1998 but the putting together of serious viable options led by the club's officers began during

the summer of 1999. In October at a special meeting of the general committee and Vice Presidents our Chairman, Mark Binns gave a stimulating presentation detailing the current state of our club and a "wish list" for improvements. This included a new pavilion with all services (remember electricity was unheard of), car park and better access, plus field levelling to improve safety for junior practice and enhance playing conditions. The rough costs were £125,000. Our own building fund stood at £5,000 and it was expected that we would need to raise of further £20,000 to add to anticipated external funding. There were sharp intakes of breath, and once some of our senior members had received Oxygen, it was agreed to put the proposals to a full meeting of the club with the recommendation that we proceed. That agreement to move forward was given by a well attended EGM on 3rd November 1999.

Following confirmation from Kirklees MC that our lease on the ground would be extended to 25 years if we successfully applied for lottery funding, preliminary meetings took place with David Gent of Kirklees MC for funds from the Council and advice in making a lottery bid. The wheels were well in motion as planning applications were made, soil samples were taken and more detailed costings explored. By July 2000 the projected costs had risen to £237,000 and at a further EGM in August members were updated on the figure, but there was determination from the club to press on. We received Stage 1 support from Sport England in November and the real work began to prepare our Action Plan to consolidate our funding request.

The 7 man Steering Committee held its first formal meeting in January 2001 and its composition was fully supported by the

general committee to whom it reported. The extent of our own fundraising commitments was made & a public meeting was held on 23rd May in the Methodist church. Although club members were outnumbered, the attendance was not stunning but the concerns of our neighbours over such things as parking were addressed.

The Steering Group continued to meet monthly and work hard on the Action Plan. Options on the amount of gradient to be taken from the top of the field were carefully considered. For the playing surface to be ready for the 2002 season it was crucial that the levelling work start in mid-August and the decision to proceed at our own risk, as final Sport England approval had not been received, was taken. We played our last 6 league home matches on alternative grounds and Pugh-Lewis, chosen after tender, began work on 14th August changing the famous contours of our ground forever! The weather was not always kind and there were worrying drainage problems but we now have a splendid playing area.

After a great deal of liaising with Jonathan Couves and other Sport England representatives, at the end of October to our final relief, we received notification of a grant of £251,755 to assist in the funding of our development project of £340,211. Courtesy of our chairman, champagne was drunk for the first time at a committee meeting!

After the tendering process the contract for the pavilion, car park and access road was eventually awarded to Marsden builders who began work in early November by demolishing and burning out

existing buildings. We had previously salvaged any items worth keeping except for the legendary tea-urn which was ruthlessly cast aside by the Chairman's henchmen!

Two of our own members, Jonathan Harding (plumbing) and David Mellor (Joinery) were subcontractors to the project. Naturally there have been delays to the project due to the weather and specification changes deemed necessary, so the Steering Group has been involved throughout the development. The end result is, as you see, a superb pavilion in natural stone with full services including showers and an excellent function room.

To add to our level and now safe playing area two further tracks have been added to the square. Two artificial practice bays are in operation and additional grass practice bays are being produced for next season. The bottom fencing will prevent many balls from disappearing into the hedge and with the white boundary rope and sightscreens we have facilities of which we can be justly proud.

We are grateful for the patience and persistence of our members and friends in pursuing our fundraising target - a remarkable achievement for an all amateur club with a relatively low proportion of senior players. Amongst other efforts over the last two years in particular, supporters have enjoyed themselves at BBQs/Dances & Ceilidhs, gambled in the Grand Draw and 500 club, coached youngsters at Summer Cricket Festivals and baked for Cake Stalls & Coffee Mornings. We have received generous donations including the £1,000 anonymously pushed through my letterbox soon after the start of the appeal.



Well, we've made it!!!

After 2 1/2 years of planning & fund-raising "The Wes" played their 1st home game of the season against Denby on Saturday 13th July at our re-developed Kaye Lane ground on a lovely summer's day watched by dozens of members, friends, neighbours and well-wishers.

Over the next few weeks we expect all the teething problems associated with a new building to be ironed out as we put the finishing touches to our facility. The delay in completion of some 11 weeks resulted in a staggered handover from the contractors and it will take until the end of the year for the whole site to settle down and for us to develop new routines.

Our return to Kaye Lane and a new normality is a watershed in our history which brings to an end 4 years of project management & fund-raising. We can now direct all our energies into further developing our cricket programmes, our on-field success and our facilities.

Our new ground will require a different management style and will be more costly to run, but also opens up a whole range of possibilities for increased social & community use and for revenue generation. We have already hosted our 1st sponsored game, held our first social/fundraising evening at the pavilion and taken our 1st private party booking.

A final word of thanks to everyone who has played a part with time, or money in making our ground re-development the success it has become.

We have already received many favourable comments from those who have visited Kaye Lane and who have been impressed by both the ground and the pavilion.

A sincere word of thanks to everyone and we hope that you enjoyed the grand opening.
