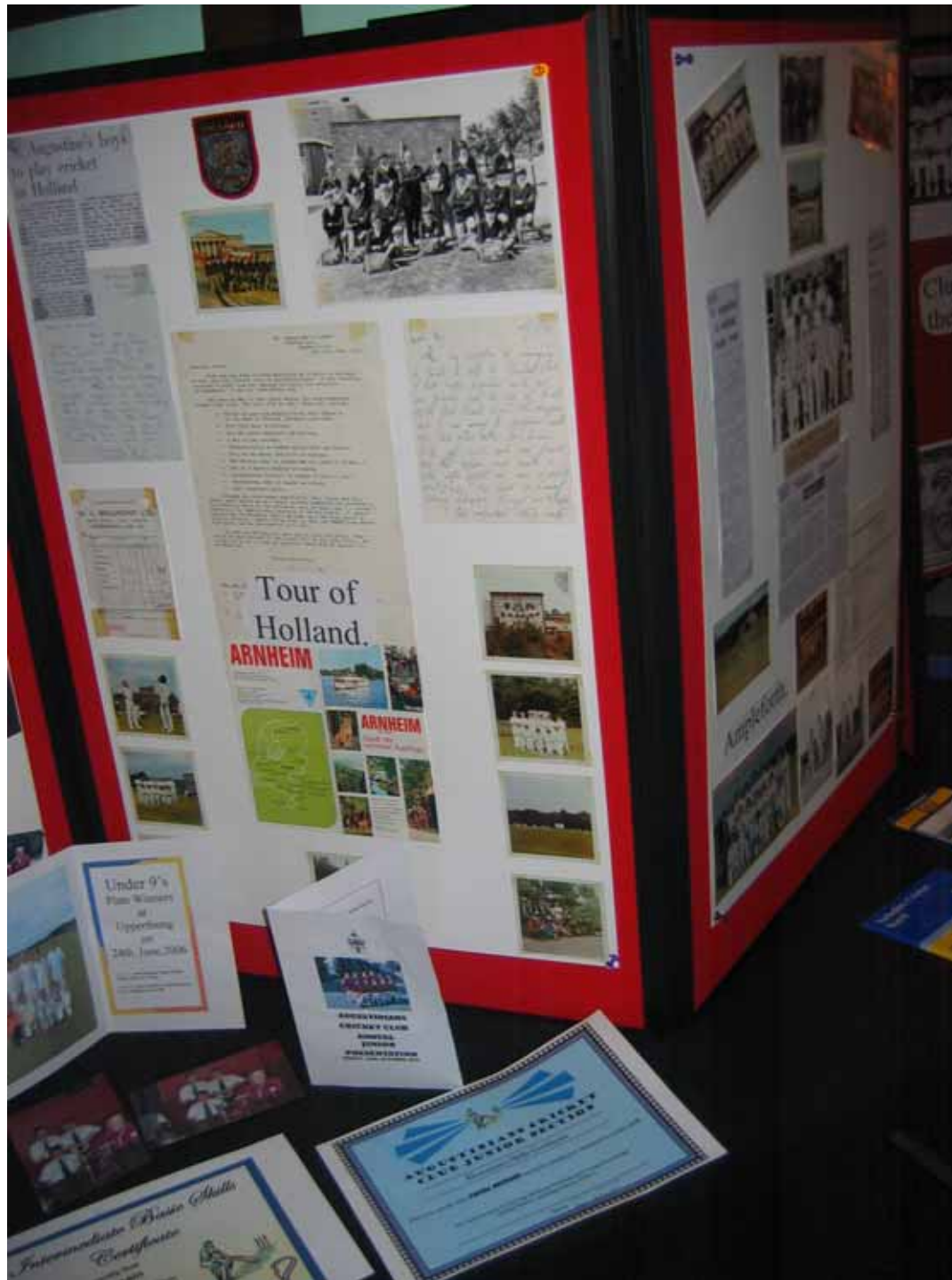

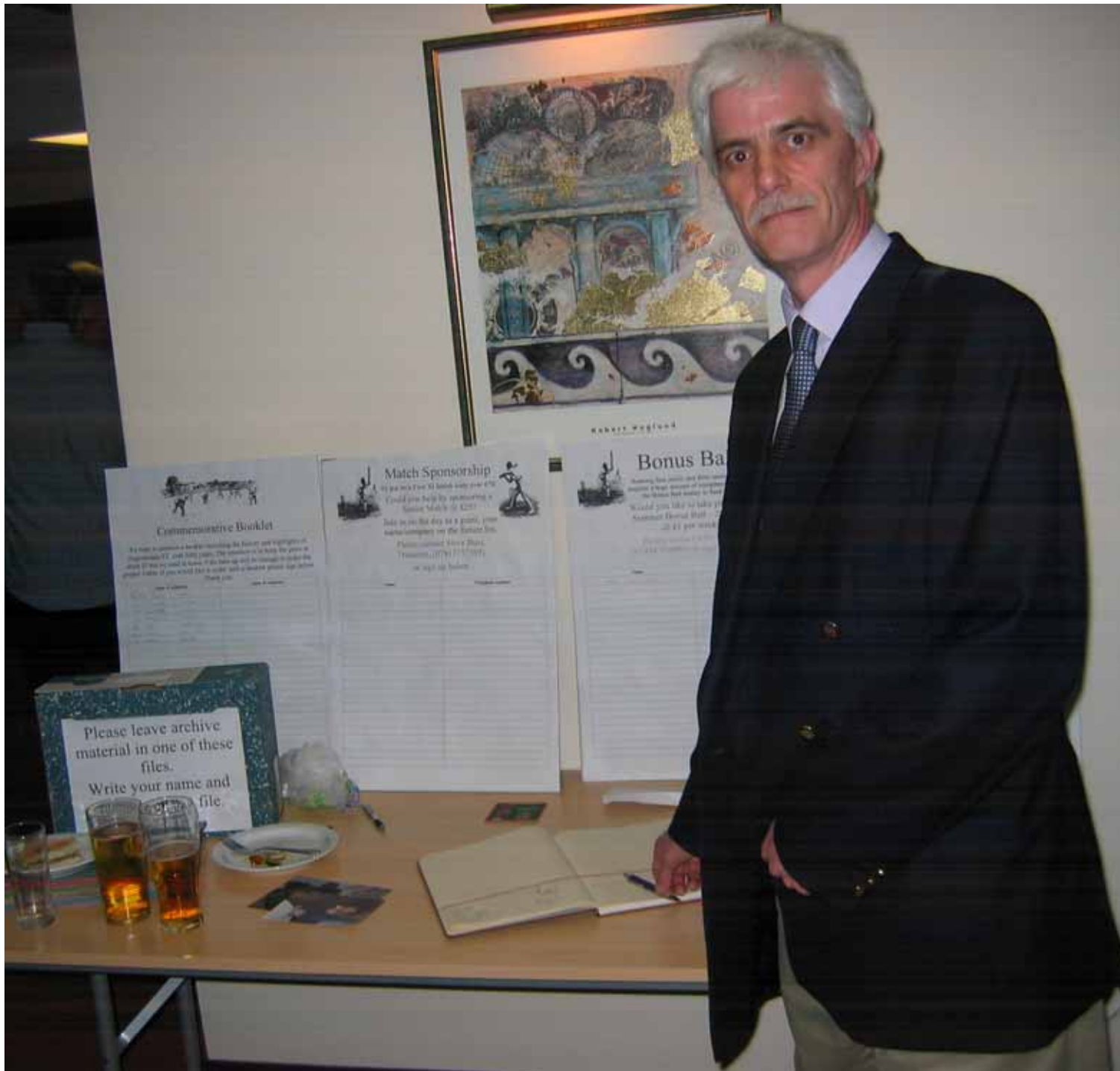

Augustinians C.C. was founded in 1967. One important note on the Club's unofficial website says that the Club was formed 'from the remnants of John Finbar Harold's starts team', but the reality was that the new team was connected to St. Augustine's Voluntary School, Bradley Bar.

UNITY BIRTH

When St. Augustine's merged with a nearby school, St. Gregory's Grammar, in the late 1970s to form St. David's School, the Cricket Club continued to thrive, recruiting staff, pupils and new fans from all three institutions.



In the early 1990s, the Club was reduced to a number of key individuals: Brian Green, Frank Houghton, Peter Lawrence, Stuart and Lesley Houghton, plus regulars during 1st XI support and Stuart Smith (1st XI player).

And then, there was John Harold, a sponsor of the club in its infancy and 1980s, who had completed the club. Harold used named as president of the Association. His term of office began in 1975 and he went on to lead in 1988 when the League transferred to Huddersfield.

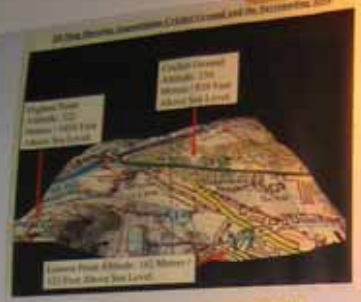

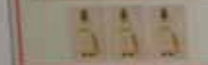

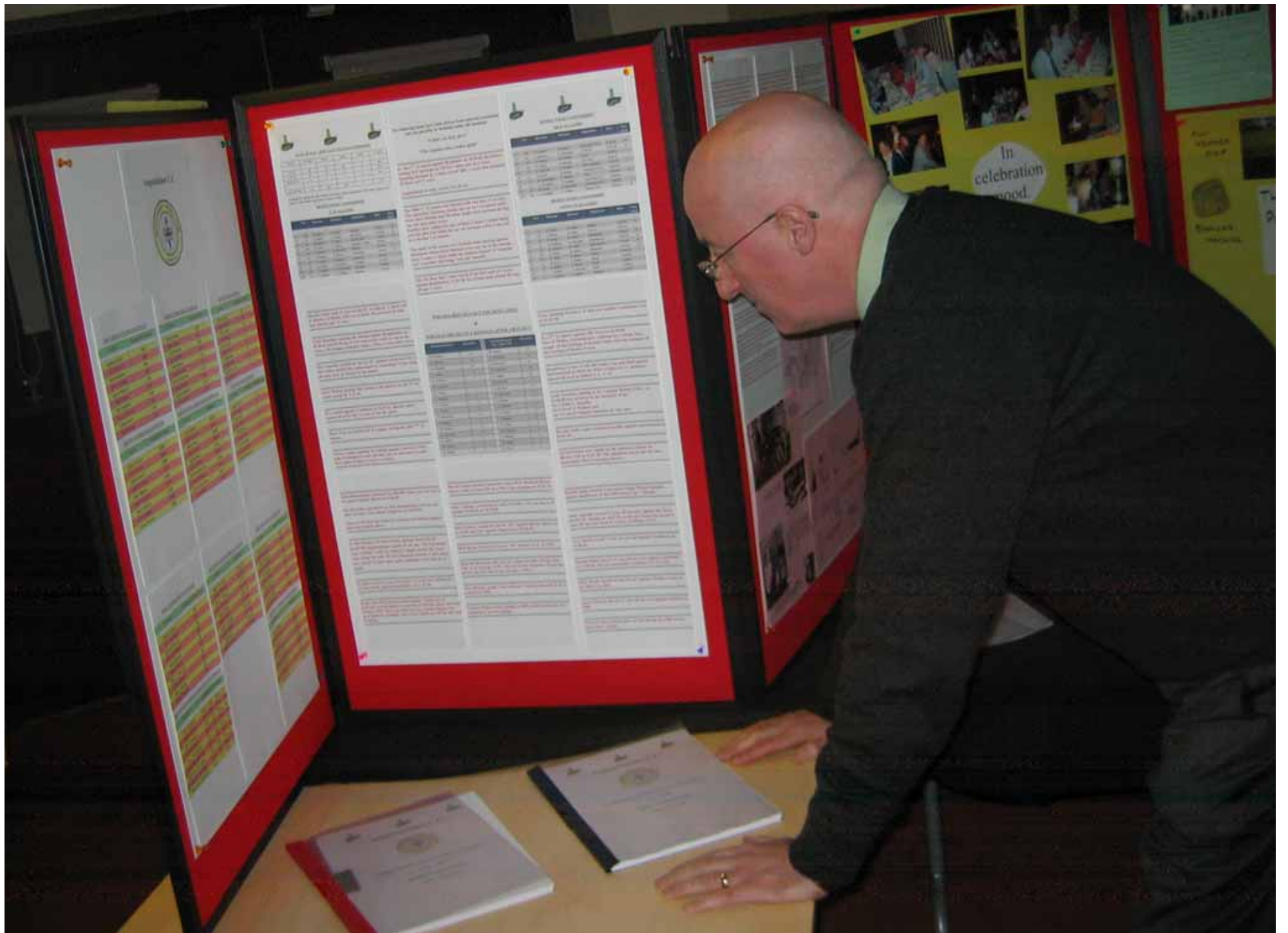
