

Delight all round at Primrose Hill

Life starts again for cricketers

PLAYERS, spectators and officials at Primrose Hill Cricket Club have spoken of their delight at the club coming back from the verge of extinction.

Just last month the Drakes Hud- derfield League club with a 73 year history was given little chance of survival.

The axe looked set to fall on the club - known as P.H.C. - because of a lack of officials.

But on Saturday the sound of leather on willow was heard once again as the Cross Lane pitch at Primrose Hill played Almondbury in their first game of the season.

A last-minute cash boost from Brighouse based businessman Russell Kinsey, whose grandfather lives in Primrose Hill, gave new life to the club.

Mr Bruce Heath, who stepped in at the 11th hour to become treasurer and general secretary of the newly named Primrose Hill Sports Club, was at the ground to see the game.

"It was relaxing and quite exhilarating to see this game actually go ahead," he said.

"It has been hectic as we tried to get everything into place. It's been a race against time."

Mr Heath, new chairman Lesley Spence, secretary Will Watson and vice chairman Margaret Clark, all stepped forward to help after meeting at the Executive of the club's potential fate.

"We did not want to see a club with the history Primrose Hill has go down," said Mr Heath.

"My brother used to come here and if I was in the area I would watch the odd game. But, other than that, I didn't have any links with the club."

Spectator Mr Derrick Johnson said "he was glad to be back at Cross Lane."

"I was very quiet when it looked like the club was going to close," he said. "I have been watching the club for four or five years and they've had some very good players."

Player Darren Dennis has been with the club for more than a decade and said many of his team mates had also been there since they were juniors.

"We have probably the best team spirit in Huddersfield," he said. "I don't think anybody here would play for another team even if the club had folded."

His brother, Glynn, also a player, said: "We had faith we would carry on going. We've had seasons on the pen where things have looked bad and we've thought 'will there be a team?'"

"But we always pull through."

And even the followers of Saturday's opponents Almondbury were pleased to see P.H.C. survive.

"We are delighted they are staying

in the league," said one. "They have got a lot of work to do in the last few weeks to make sure of it."

"There is camaraderie between all cricketers and followers and it's good they've got over their troubles."

Unfortunately the team lost on Saturday although it was a close match. Primrose Hill made 126 for 6, but Almondbury ended up 128-9.

And yesterday Primrose Hill lost again - being all out for 29 at Elland Seconds, who scored 39-0.
