

Walkers Arms – The pub has an excellent view onto the cricket pitch. Spectators can enjoy a drink while they watch the game unfold. With its close proximity to the pitch drinkers are actually in danger of being hit by the cricket ball! The Walkers is also a good venue for players from both teams to enjoy a drink after the game.



The ground – It is evident that the playing area is relatively small when we see the proximity of the pub to the wicket and also the closeness of the benches.

Countryside – The club enjoys a semi-rural location with views out over the attractive surrounding countryside. This is a feature of many of the cricket grounds in the Huddersfield area. As well as the nearby housing there are splendid views looking down the Colne Valley.

The ground – It is one of the smaller grounds in the Central League and has a good atmosphere on matchdays. It also has terrific views.

Emley Moor Transmitting Station – It is the tallest freestanding structure in the British Isles at a height of 330.4 metres. The current tower is the third structure to have occupied the site. On 19 March 1969, a combination of strong winds and the weight of ice that had formed around the top of the mast brought the second tower down.



The ground – Leymoor is one of the few grounds in the Central League to have won the prestigious H.Robinson Trophy for the most improved ground. The groundsman has done a superb job.

Houses – these nearby houses have a great view over the cricket field. Often, locals will sit outside in their back garden and watch the game!
