

# OUTLANE'S DOUBLE

Outlane, who have won the Association League Cup, met Rastrick New Road on Saturday for the last match of the season. New Road played only nine men, and only Albert Bottomley (28) could stand up to the bowling of D. Shaw (five for 15) and G. Beaumont (three for 25). Their total was 40. Outlane also found runs hard to get, and lost six wickets before victory was gained. H. Lamb played a steady innings for 23 not out.

During the interval the presentation of the Association Cup took place. Mr. J. E. Owen, the League secretary, presided. He mentioned that at the present time the Association was in a fairly strong position. In another three years it will have been in existence half a century. During that time nearly £500 had been handed over to the Royal Infirmary as proceeds from the Lamb Cup, and from that fact alone the League had justified its existence. It was only right that the champions should get a trophy as their reward, but there was something else that both winners and losers could get from the game—enjoyment and fellowship. He complimented Outlane upon the season's performance, and appealed to all members of the clubs forming the League to take a larger interest in the club's work, as in the more serious affairs of life, the more one put in the more one could get out.

Mr. J. Knight, the League president, who presented the Cup, said he always liked to visit Outlane, whether it was to presentations, demonstrations, or to "stand in the middle." When "in the middle" he often heard remarks that were anything but complimentary. These never affected him; he ignored them entirely, and he would advise all umpires to do the same. He had seen Outlane play on several occasions, and could say they were worthy winners of the League Cup. He then handed over the Cup to the captain, George Casson, who expressed his pleasure at receiving the trophy, and mentioned the hearty manner in which his men had backed him up, also the way the vice-captain (R. Hargreaves) had taken on the duties of captain when he (the speaker) was absent on business.

He then moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Owen and Mr. Knight for their services, and this was supported by Mr. W. Ainley, the Outlane president, who said he was delighted to be connected with the club. The team spirit was very strong, and besides winning the League Cup again they had also won the Lamb Cup and thus brought off the "double." Mr. Owen briefly replied.
