NOTES ON CRICKET.

OLD TOWN WIN THE CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE CALDER VALLEY LEAGUE.
Old Town and Roomfield met on Saturday in the final for the Calder Valley League. The match was played on the Mytholmroyd Wesleyans' ground, and being favoured with nice weather there was a fair muster of spectators. Both sides had their following of supporters, who occasionally made their presence known.

It has been usual in former seasons for the four top clubs in the sections to play semi-final matches to decide the finalists, but this time the custom was dispensed with.

Old Town, as cricket follows will hardly need to be reminded, headed the Hebden Bridge section of the League, whilst Roomfield led the Todmorden section, and neither of these had lost a match throughout the season. This is somewhat a remarkable record, we believe in the League fixtures. To go through the League fixtures unscathed is no ordinary achievement. It was indeed a feat in the championship. As they had not met previously, it was impossible to draw comparisons there. Both sides were equally confident of success. Old Town had the better average in their section, with 27 points, having played 15 matches and won 11, whereas Roomfield out of 14 games had won 9 and gained 23 points. On the other hand Roomfield had some experience of the final, being runners-up last year, and thus they held the opinion that in the natural order of things it was now their turn to win. And it was Old Town's intention to divert that natural order if at all possible. Neither Old Town nor Roomfield had ever won the cup.

To turn to the game, Old Town opened batting. Taylor and Wilkinson opposed Crowther and Marshall. Taylor, by the way, was very well up in the League batting averages, whilst on the other hand Crowther headed the bowling averages, and Marshall followed not far behind. Hume came steadily, and 14 stood on the board when Taylor failed at a ball from Gopwiger. Feather joined Wilkinson, and 17 more were added ere a misunderstanding saw the former run out. There was a consistency about the Old Town batsmen which served a useful purpose; runs were wanted, and the first six men all contributed their quota. Edgar Wilkinson played vigorously, and added up the score, although he was a little heavy. The Roomfield side was not up to par, but perhaps this is excusable on such an uneven outfield. When half the wickets were down the score stood at 55, and as each wicket cost an average of nine runs, the total mounted up. A double change in the bowling had a marked effect, Greenwood and Sutcliffe accounting for seven wickets amongst them. W. H. Green-

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wood and Kershaw were the only two who failed to break their "duck." Moss hit hard for a bit, but "Strat" beat him in the race for second place. Wilkinson was easily top scorer with 55 out of a total of 88. It was generally regarded as a good enough score. The batting of Old Town, if not always elegant, was certainly vigorous; runs were aimed at and runs were obtained.

Roomfield started upon their task with apparently little hope of success. Defeat loomed before their eyes and daunted them, and they never rallied to give a taste of their true form. Four wickets were down for eight runs, and this state of things is enough to knock the steam out of most cricketers. Kershaw had captured three of the wickets with out a run being scored on him. Howarth and E. S. Howarth stemmed the tide of disaster for a while, but before long they were separated. Still they never appeared to be in danger, and were distinctly lucky to be as long together. Old Town in the field did not cover themselves with glory. After Howarth fell the game was "all over" except the lighting. Feather and Gudgeon displaced Kershaw and Moss with the ball, and quickly polished off the remaining batsmen. Wignard struck well, playing very intelligently, but fell in second wicket down, and was a bit of a man out for him. The innings produced only 43, so that Old Town won quite easily. The Todmorden team gave a very disappointing display.

After the match there was a rush of spectators to the pavilion. Old Town were justly hailed, the winners, and the players came in for much cheering. A late cry came on behalf of Roomfield: "Are we downhearted?" and was responded to with a roar: "No!" It had been previously arranged that there should be only a formal presentation of the cup, the idea being that a later function should take place at either Todmorden or Hebden Bridge. It will now take place at Hebden Bridge. Mr. Jeremiah Crossley, the president of the League, was unable to be present at the match; in his absence the trophy was simply handed over by Mr. E. M. Priestley to Mr. Taylor, the captain of the winners, and there was much of a going on. Afterwards the winners mounted a wagonette, and with the cup displayed prominently, they drove first to Old Town and back again into Hebden Bridge, receiving ovations en route. The cup was several times filled and various toasts honoured. On reaching home, the conquerors were accorded an enthusiastic welcome by the villagers.

LAST MATCH OF THE SEASON.
The last match of the season in this League was between Booth and Stainland, and a completed table appears in this issue for the sake of record. The game ended in a draw.
