NORTHORAM'S SIDE

A. BUTTERWORTH—Alan, the captain, is a consistent batsman with a highest score of 101 not out to his credit. He has also played with Halifax and Lightcliffe, and he is now in his third season at Northoram.

T. TENNYSON—After 14 seasons with Barkland, Terry joined Northoram and is in his third season with the club. He is an attractive first-wicket batsman.

J. HOWDEN—John, a former junior player is in his 19th season with the club. He scored 60 against Mackintosh's earlier in the season and is also a useful slow left-arm bowler.

D. JACKSON—The most experienced member of the side, David is a solid batsman and a good fielder. He previously played with Skelton.

V. BARBER—Vernon, a fine all-rounder, is a former winner of

the league bowling prize. His highest score is 145 against Barkland, and he is a former junior player at Northoram.

T. BARBER—The second member of the Barber family, Trevor and Lightcliffe before becoming established as a senior player at Northoram. He played with the juniors though, and is a favoured batsman.

J. ANDREW—John is in his fifth season with the club, having previously played with Bradshaw. He is a fine fieldman, though, and his main talent is his attractive stroke play.

H. ANDREW—A member of the second pair of brothers with the club, Harry, who is the secretary, is a former captain. He was with Bradshaw for 14 seasons. He is a right-hand bat and a useful close-to-the-wicket fieldman.

A. KELLETT—Better known as a footballer with the Halifax Rugby League Club, Alan is a left-arm fast bowler, although he has represented the league as a batsman.

F. DAWSON—Peter is a former junior player. He has had experience with Bradford League, with Lightcliffe. He is a sound batsman and the wicket-keeper.

B. VARLEY—Brian is in his third season with the club. Before moving to Northoram, he was with Webster's and he appeared in their cup winning side.

R. POLLARD—There is a strong Rugby League flavour about the side for Roy used to play with Bramley. He is in his fourth season with Northoram.

D. BRARLEY—Derek is a former junior. His main talent is his ability to change the course of the game with some big hitting.

TRIANGLE must start favourites to beat Northoram in the Halifax Parish Cup final at the Ramsdens, home of King Cross Cricket Club tomorrow (2.30).

TRIANGLE'S LINE-UP

N. ASHCROFT—Norman began his career with the first Triangle team at the age of 13 in 1953. He returned to the club after 13 seasons at Sowerby Bridge, seven of them as captain. He is captain at Triangle.

R. RODGER—Dick is a former Halifax Town footballer. He is an opening batsman and the vice-captain. And won the league batting prize in 1964. He began his career in the third team at the age of 13.

B. HUNTER—This all-rounder will be playing in his third cup final, having scored a century on one of them in his previous appearances. He has captained the first team, and began with the third team at the age of 13.

T. MADDEN—Terry is the spearhead of the attack and one of the quickest bowlers in the

league. He played for Sowerby Bridge for six seasons before joining Triangle in 1963. Last season he represented Halifax in the Yorkshire League.

B. GANNON—Brian has played all his cricket with the club, having graduated from the junior side. A brilliant cover point, he serves as a batsman in the field. He is also a hard-hitting batsman.

N. NORMANTON—After playing with Bradshaw and Greenland, this fast medium bowler is in his second season at the club. He is the main support for Madden.

J. PATRICK—John had 11 seasons with Sowerby Bridge before joining Triangle in 1963. He is a prolific scoring batsman and a sound wicket-keeper.

J. TURNER—This young player has graduated from the third

team, and is a forceful number three batsman. He is just running into form at the right time.

J. COOK—One of the successes of the season — his first with the club — this personality opens the batting and has been making wickets with his spinners. He is making a comeback after a lay-off.

B. INGHAM—Robert, who also plays Rugby Union for the Vandalas is a fine short-leg fieldman and a promising middle-order batsman. He, too, has graduated from the third team.

K. SENIOR—This experienced player is in his second season with Triangle after a long association with Stones. He is a sound batsman and a useful slow bowler.
