

DALTON STARS

ANDREW CROSSLAND

Andrew Crossland was born in 1817 and died in 1902. One of the great pioneers of Dalton and Yorkshire cricket, *Wisden* said of him: *'He can bat, bowl and field exceedingly well'*.

His career with Yorkshire began in 1844 and ended in 1855. But he also played for the All England XI in two first-class matches at Lord's in 1857 and appeared in many other matches both for and against the great touring XIs of his period.

Crossland also appeared for stake money in many single-wicket matches, and in one he played against Bendingo *'the Prize Pugilist'*. His career did not end until he was 70 years old.

H. BATES

Award-winning Huddersfield League batsman in 1910, 1913 and 1914.



JOSEPH CROSSLAND

Joseph Crossland played alongside his brother Andrew in most of Dalton's greatest matches.

However, his career with Yorkshire was much briefer, lasting only one year, 1850. This was possibly because he took a permanent position as professional with Todmorden in the 1840s.

Award-winning Huddersfield batsman in 1960.



GEORGE BERRY

George Berry was the oldest of the Berry brothers. He played for Yorkshire between 1845 and 1851.

But like most leading cricketers of the period he appeared in many more important fixtures, both for and against the great touring XI's. *Scores and Biographies*, which preceded *Wisden* as cricket's leading publication, said that Berry '*hits hard and well, bowls round arm of middle speed, and in the field is generally point*'.

JOHN BERRY

Like his uncle George, John Berry bowled *'round arm at middle speed'* and, as a batsman, hit *'hard and well'*. His Yorkshire career spanned the period between the early representative teams and the formation of the County Club. He made his debut in 1849 and played his last YCCC match in 1867.

During this time he played in 47 first-class matches and made his highest score of 78 against Kent at Gravesend in 1865. He was employed as professional by the Sheffield Wednesday club between 1851 and 1861 before moving on to Rochdale and Accrington.

JOSEPH BERRY

Although not related to John and George, Joseph Berry followed in the Berry cricketing tradition, playing for Dalton and Yorkshire.

Scores and Biographies described him as ‘a good bat, splendid fielder, and an excellent medium pace bowler’. He played in only 4 first-class matches, but his career spanned the 13 years between 1861 and 1874.

THE WILSON FAMILY

Old John Wilson played in 49 of the 51 'Great Matches' Dalton played between 1841 and 1851.

He was also a founder member of the Club and his brother Samuel played regularly in the 1840s.

John's son, also called Samuel, played 34 seasons for the Club after its greatest days were over, and another family member, F. Wilson, won the Huddersfield League bowling prize in 1900.
