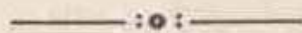

Rules of the Association.

1. That this Association be called "The Huddersfield and District Cricket Association."
2. That the objects of the Association shall be for the purpose of furthering the interests of Cricket, and for the better organisation of the Clubs of the Association, the number of clubs in membership to be unlimited.
3. That the Association shall be governed by a Committee, consisting of one representative from each Club, out of which shall be elected President, 3 Vice-Presidents (the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer may be elected from outside the Association), seven to form a quorum. Meetings shall be called at the written request of not less than five Clubs, or at the discretion of the President or Secretary, and that four clear days' notice be given for Meeting.
4. That any Club desiring to enter the Association shall be proposed and seconded at a meeting of the General Committee.

5. That the Subscription for each Club shall be One Guinea per annum, payable in advance, due 1st March, and any Club not having paid the same before 1st May shall be excluded from the benefits of the Association.

6. That the Annual or General Meeting shall consist of two representatives from each Club.

7. That all Clubs entering the Association shall abide by its decision and obey the Rules, and any Club failing to do so shall be dealt with as the Association determines.

8. The Clubs forming the Association shall arrange Home and Home Fixtures with each other. **Stumps to be drawn at 7 p.m. May and August, and 7-30 p.m. in June and July, and 6-30 p.m. in April, and 6 p.m. in Septemeer,** and play shall proceed till the aforesaid times, stumps to be drawn as soon as the match is won. **Matches shall commence not later than 3 o'clock,** and in all cases where a late start is made through either Club being late, the lost time to be made up, and that the **home Club roll and prepare the wicket before starting,** the first ball in the match to be considered the time of starting, but under any circumstances the match must end immediately

on expiration of such extended time. Any Club refusing to play when ordered by the Umpires shall forfeit the match.

9. Neutral umpires as appointed by the Huddersfield and District Cricket Association shall serve for all first team Association matches. Any Club which omits to send an umpire to the ground arranged by the Association shall forfeit to the Association the sum of 5/-, 1/6 of which to be handed to the substitute by the Association; and in all cases where an official umpire does not put in an appearance at the match where he has been deputed to act, the two captains may agree upon a substitute (preference being given in all cases to umpires registered with the Association), who shall possess all the powers of the official umpire. Clubs provide their own umpires for second team matches.

10. Each club shall send to the Hon. Secretary of the Association by the 1st April a complete list of competing members. No member of a club whose name has not been registered five clear days to date of match to be allowed to play in same. Any club playing an ineligible man under this Rule shall have two points deducted.

11. Any Club registering a player after April 24th shall pay the sum of 6d to the

Association Treasurer for each player registered, the fee to accompany registration.

12. The Home Club shall send to the Hon. Secretary of the Association the result of each match, with full score and bowling analysis, within two days after being played. **Any Club neglecting to do so shall be fined 2/6.**

13. A match won shall count two points, and a drawn game one point. Matches not played on account of bad weather shall be counted as drawn games and each Club shall receive one point.

14. All protests to be lodged with the Association Secretary within forty-eight hours of the match, in writing, to be accompanied by a fee of 10s., which shall be forfeited if the protest is considered frivolous, and all offending Clubs to be notified by the protesting Club at the same time.

15. Any Club failing to fulfil its Association engagements may be summarily dismissed from the Association and forfeit all rights therein, unless able to explain its conduct to the satisfaction of the Association.

16. No member of a club shall play with more than one club in Association matches in any one year, nor any player be allowed to transfer his services from any other club without

the permission of the Association, but such player may be allowed to play with any other club (except clubs forming the Association), if his own club is not engaged in an Association match.

17. The Association shall have power to deal with any offending club or clubs, player or players, as they may think fit, and deal with any matter not provided for in these Rules.

18. Any member transferring his services from one club to another to pay all old subscriptions to his former club.

19. That clubs failing to send representatives to meeting to be fined one shilling.

20. That all fines be paid to the Association Treasurer not later than the following meeting.

21. No alteration of these Rules shall take effect unless carried by a two-thirds majority of the members who vote at an Association meeting specially convened for that purpose. Notice of any alteration to be in the hands of the Secretary 14 days before such meeting, and clubs to be notified thereof 7 days previous to meeting.

22. A member of a club playing in 5 first eleven matches must obtain permission from the Emergency Committee before again playing with the second eleven, each application to be accompanied with full particulars of the player's

average. Any club playing an ineligible man under this Rule shall have two points deducted.

23. Clubs failing to fulfil their engagements shall be fined 5s. for each offence. Any club failing to appear with 8 players shall be fined 2s. 6d. for each offence.

24. That these Rules apply to Second Elevens in all cases.

25. Medals will be given to the winners of the First Eleven Competition.

26. All boundaries must count 4 for a hit,
2 for a bye.

27. All Home Clubs must provide tackling for visiting teams.

28. First Elevens play for Association Challenge Cup and Second Elevens for Association Shield.



The Challenge Cup Rules.

—:0:—

1. The Cup shall be called "THE HUDDERSFIELD AND DISTRICT CRICKET ASSOCIATION CHALLENGE CUP."

3. The Cup shall be the property of the Clubs forming the Association, and its management shall be vested in the President, Secretary, and Committee for the time being. No Club to become the absolute owner.

3. It shall be competed for each year by the Clubs forming the Association. The Club gaining the highest number of points to be adjudged the winner, but in case of a tie, the Clubs shall play a deciding game for possession of the Cup.

4. No Club withdrawing from the Association shall have any claim to compensation or to be repaid any share which might have been subscribed by them.

5. The Club winning the Cup shall give a bond by one or more sureties to the amount of £30 for the safe custody and return of the Cup.

6. The Cup shall be returned to the Committee on the First Meeting in August in the year following.

Lumb Cup Rules.



1. That the Cup shall be called "THE LUMB CHALLENGE CUP," and shall be open for competition to the Clubs who are members of the Huddersfield and District Cricket Association. This Competition is for Amateurs only.

2. The Cup is the property of the Huddersfield and District Cricket Association. No Club can possibly win the Cup outright.

3. No person shall play for more than one Club in Cup Tie matches, and must have played with his Club in at least five matches before the commencement of the Cup Ties.

4. Play shall commence not later than 2-30. In case of a late start the defaulting Club shall be liable to a fine of 2/-, at the discretion of the Committee. Should the game not be finished, it shall be played out on or before the following Friday. In all cases where a match does not commence on a Saturday, the opposing Clubs must pay the umpires. For extra time after first day's play, the Association shall defray the umpire's expenses, excepting the semi-finals, when the competing Clubs shall pay all expenses.

5. In case of a tie, the match must be played out on the visitor's ground, and the players may be changed.

6. In all Cup Tie matcees, members and subscribers of competing teams to pay at the gates. The gate money to be divided between the competing Clubs after expenses of match are paid, except the final; which shall be devoted to the Infirmary.

7. Any Club drawing a bye cannot have another bye in the next round.

8. The result of all Cup Tie matches must be sent to the Hon. Sec. of the Association (by the Hon. Sec. of the home team), to be received by him not later than the Monday following the match.

9. Any objection under these Rules must be sent in writing to the Hon. Sec. of the Association, to be received by him not later than the Monday following the match, to be accompanied by a fee of one guinea, which sum shall be forfeited should the Committee consider the objection frivolous or groundless.

10. The Club winning the Cup shall give a Bond of Two Sureties to the amount of £30 for the safe custody and return of the Cup.

11. All Association Rules apply to this Competition wherever practicable.

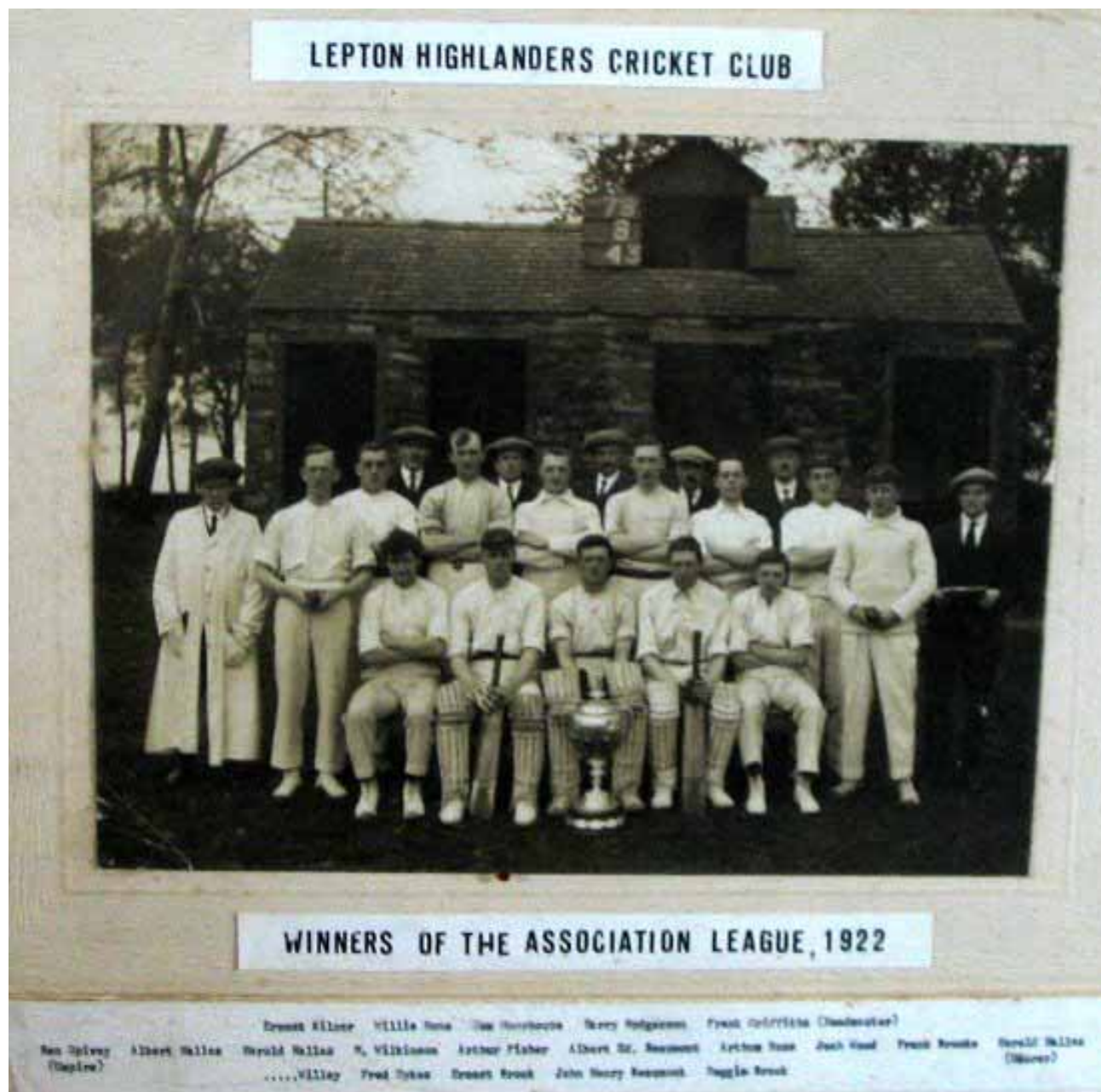
