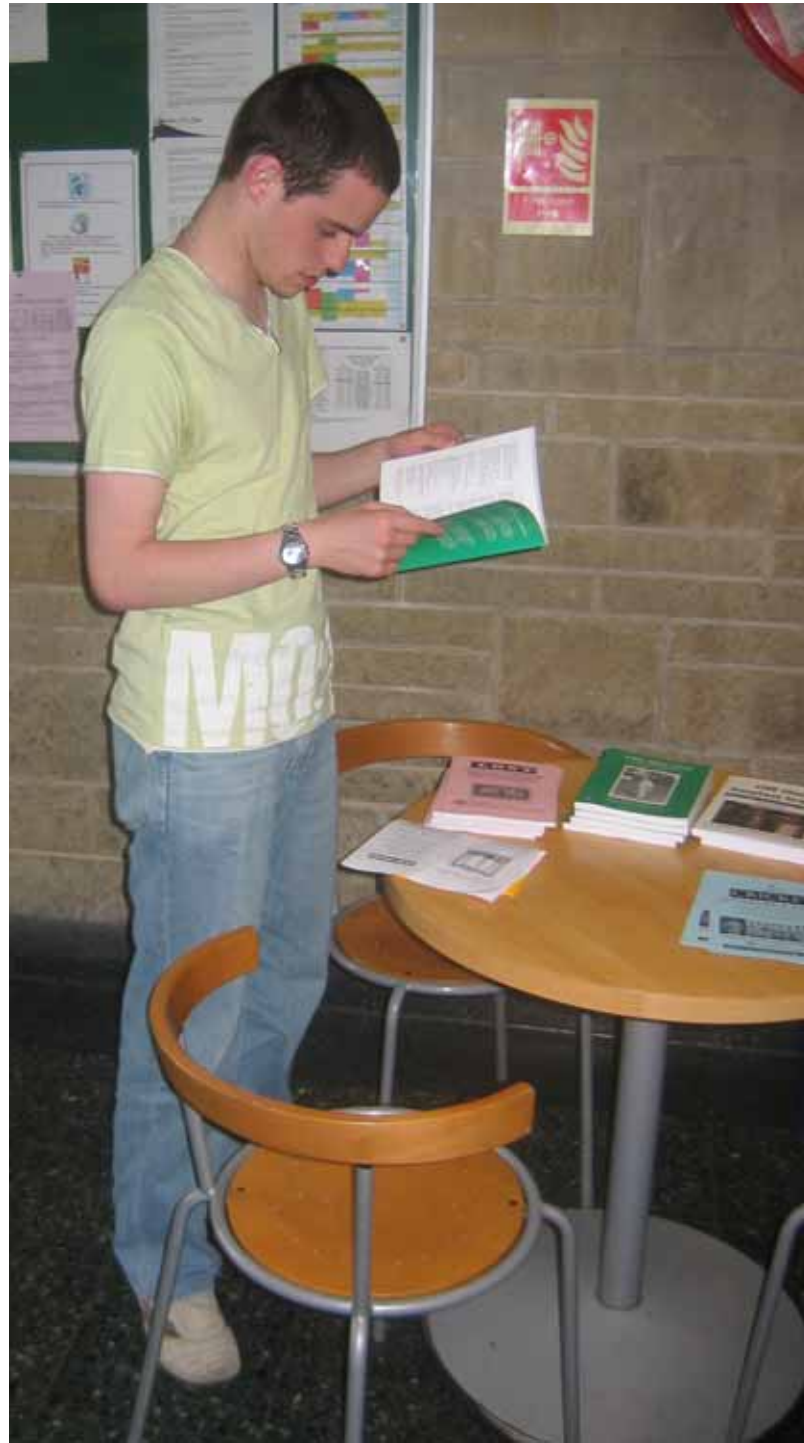

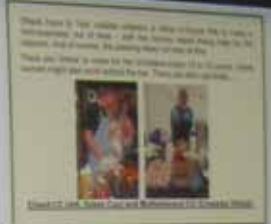

SANDWICHES & CAKES!

TEA LADIES

In the early days, inns and public houses were prominent in the provision of refreshments at cricket matches.



For example, at Keighley CC in 1873 Thomas Cowgill of the Burlington Arms was granted the 'privilege' of catering rights at the cost of £10. It is possible too that churches put on light refreshments, especially where clubs had a church link or where a club's ground was close by.

Ilkworth allowed lady members of the club from 1880 to an old 'laid' being refurbished for serving refreshments, and then the formation of a Ladies Refreshment Committee in March 1921, which enabled Ilkworth to provide teas for the 1921 season.

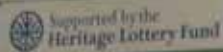

WOMEN & CRICKET IN CALDERDALE INTRODUCTION

The highlight was the role of women who played a central role in the development of the game. The early years of the game were dominated by men, but women began to play in the 18th century. The first women's cricket club was formed in 1742 in Calverley, West Yorkshire. The club was known as the Calverley Cricket Club and was founded by a group of women who were interested in the game. The club played on a field near the village and was one of the earliest women's cricket clubs in the world.
