HUDDERSFIELD AND DISTRICT CRICKET ASSOCIATION.

RULES OF THE ASSOCIATION

Please Note Alteration of Bye-Laws, and Rule 6 and 7 for Cup Ties.

- 1.—That this Association be called the "HUDDERSFIELD AND DISTRICT CRICKET ASSOCIATION."
- 2.—That the object of the Association shall be for the purpose of furthering the interests of Cricket, and for the better organization of the Clubs of the Association.
- 3.—That the Association consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Hon. Secretary, who shall be ex-officio members of the Committee, and one representative from each Club entering the Association.
- 4.—That any Club desiring to enter the Association shall be Proposed and Seconded at a Meeting of the General Committee, carried by a majority, and pay an entrance fee of five shillings on Proposition.
- 5.—That the Subscription of each Club shall be 12s. per annum, payable in advance, due 1st March, and any Club not having paid the same before 1st April, shall be excluded from the benefits of the Association.
- 6.—That the Annual or General Meeting shall consist of the Executive, and one representative from each Club, no two Clubs to be represented by the same individual; and that the Executive shall have power to call special General Meetings as they may deem necessary.
- 7.—That the general business of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee of ten members, who shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to be held on the first Tuesday in October each year, at 7.0 p.m.
- 8.—That five members of the Committee form a quorum.
- 9.—That the Committee meet on the 1st Tuesday in each month, at 7.0 p.m., and that the Hon. Secretary be empowered to call Special Meetings should occasion require.
- 10.—That in the event of any alteration in the Rules of the Association, notice of the proposed alteration shall be sent in writing to the Association Secretary on or before the first day of September, and he shall, on or before the 1st September, inform each Club of the proposed alteration.
- 11.—That no alteration of these Rules shall take effect unless carried by a majority of two-thirds of the members present at a General Meeting.
- 12.—That all Clubs entering this Association shall abide by its decision and obey the Rules, and any Club failing to do so shall be dealt with as the Committee determine.

BYE-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

- 1.—A batsman must bat in 9 innings before he is eligible to take Mr. J. B. Watkinson's Gold Medal for best batting average.
- 2.—A bowler must bowl in 9 innings and take not less than 30 wickets before he is eligible to take Mr. A. P. Crossland's Gold Medal for bowling.
- 3.—A wicket keeper must keep wickets in 9 innings before he is eligible to take Mr. E. Woodhead's Gold Medal for the best average number of wickets, disposed of either by catching or stumping, in Association matches.
- 4.—Unless the fixture is cancelled by the home team, clubs must in all cases fulfil their engagement.
- 5.—The Secretary of the home Club shall send in each week full score of the match and bowling analysis (together with the number of wickets taken by the wicket keeper, either caught or stumped), to the Association Secretary. And that any intentional omission on the part of any Club Secretary to sending the said score, shall render the members of such club liable to disqualification in the competition for the Association Prizes.
