# Tucker tears 'em apart!

TERRY TUCKER ... eight for 28 haul in the Association showpiece.



## WAINSTALLS SHOCK TRIUMPH

Hebden Bridge .....98  
Wainstalls (for seven) ...99

**THE** Terry Tucker touch did the trick for Wainstalls in the Amateur Association's Collinson Cup final at Sowerby Bridge yesterday.

Tucker, the veteran of the Wainstalls side, produced a devastating eight for 28 spell which set the stage for one of the biggest upsets in the 35-year history of the showpiece.

It helped his side to a three-wicket win over opponents who only last week beat them in the league by 79 runs. Bridge started hot favourites on the strength of a string of victories in recent years.

The eight nails Tucker hammered into the Hebden Bridge coffin were:

**Nail one;** score 11: Bridge skipper David Gledhill, who made 89 last week before Tucker bowled him, is adjudged leg before wicket.

**Nail two;** 26: Good-length delivery bowls other opener, Brian Hopkins.

**Nail three;** 38: Tony Lyons looks to hit to leg and gets his stumps levelled.

**Nail four;** 38: Two wickets in two balls for Tucker as Stan Hollows gets a top edge and Glynn Kershaw takes the catch at long leg.

**Nail five;** 52: Malcolm Priestley, who had denied Tucker a hat-trick, has his leg stump removed.

**Nail six;** 64: Tucker hits the stumps for a fifth time; this time it's Philip Wood, yorked.

**Nail seven;** 90: The wicket that mattered — Ken Hollows, the only man to get to grips with the four-pronged attack, is bowled attempting to hit his ninth boundary. Number three Hollows had made a fine 54.

**Nail eight;** 98: Tucker puts the finishing touches to a superb performance having Mark Lomas caught on the square leg boundary.

A total of 98 looked grossly inadequate on a decent batting track which hadn't appeared to offer much encouragement to the bowlers.

So the odds had swung drastically in favour of the underdogs, who were bidding for only their second Collinson Cup final triumph. Their previous victory was in 1964.

Granville Woolley provided a backbone for their innings, just as Ken Hollows had for Bridge.

Woolley made a solid, sensible 37 and shared in the most productive stand in the match — 31 runs — with skipper Tony Fawcett (17). He stuck around until Wainstalls had made 75 before falling leg before to Stan Hollows.

Hebden Bridge voices in the 500 crowd were starting to be heard for virtually the first time at this stage, with Wainstalls five wickets down and not noted for their late-order batting.

But much as Stan Hollows tried to spur Bridge, John Kemp and inevitably Tucker were there to set Wainstalls home. Hollows finished with four for 32.

The defeat completed a miserable weekend for Bridge, who

started it with strong hopes of a league and cup double. It started to go wrong on Saturday when they lost to Ilkworth Libs and relinquished the leadership of Division One to Wheatley Libs.

And yesterday the day belonged to Tucker and Wainstalls.

# TWICE AS NICE!

1989 – DOUBLE YEAR

1989 saw Wainstalls carry off the Collinson Cup and Division 1 Championship 'Double'.

**WAINSTALLS** were in no mood to mess about on Sunday and rounded off their double-winning season in style with a 151-run success over Eleven CC.

The title was already theirs before the game started, a league meeting on Friday deciding that Queens Road Muslims, their only challengers, would be penalised for turning up for a fixture with only six players.

Good knocks from Adrian Swift and Geoff Parkinson pushed the Collinson Cup winners through to a 191 run total and Lee Smith made mince-meat of the Eleven order taking 3-22 as they were out for 40.

At the bottom of the table, Moorside made a stunning recovery to save themselves from relegation and sent Walsden into next season's second division.

Lying bottom before the weekend Moorside met Walsden and fellow strugglers Woodhall and came away with 13 points to secure their first division future.

Against Woodhall at home Moorside collected five points after scoring 180 for nine, Asher hitting 71, and then tying the visitors down to 90 for eight.

They sent Walsden to a two-wicket defeat Shan hitting 72 of a 219 for eight total as they passed the 216 target. Walker knocking 82 of the Walsden tally.

Five wickets apiece for Parkinson and Lord brought the downfall of Paris Gates at the hands of Bridgeholme for whom Butcher hit an unbeaten 53.

Paris Gates made amends against Bradford Muslims when they registered a 117 run victory thanks to knocks of 96 by Alan Woodworth and 41 by Paul Ramsden. Skipper Dex Ruddlesden weighed in with a late 39.

Wesley Motors made up for their disappointment in the Collinson Cup final by claiming the second division title, closing the season with wins over Paris Gates II and West End.

Both successes came by good margins, Naem hitting 109 as they set 275 for eight against Paris Gates to set up a 105 run win — Saghir snapped up four wickets for 51 — and Jamell's 56 was the best knock as they hit 219 against West End, victory being secured by 59 runs.

Wesley made sure of second spot by beating West End by 24 runs, thanks to Ash collecting four wickets for 47. However, they also lost to Ovenden by 25 runs, Andrew Hardcastle taking five victims for 54 as Wesley failed to reach a 182 target.

The only threat to Wesley had been from Wheatley who ceded maximum points from their last two games, but to no avail.

They hammered Greetland Village by 153 runs scoring 210 for seven. Hunter hitting 52 not out, before Pricter led the bowling attack with five for 19 as Greetland were skittled for 57.

Hebden Bridge caused Wesley to fight harder, the victory gained by only 17 runs, but good bowling again did the trick as Harry Hall (5-52) and Harry Crowther (4-30) helped out Hebden for 169 as they chased 187 for a win.

For strugglers Greetland there was no respite, they also went down heavily to Paris Gates falling by nine wickets. Greetland, with only eight men, were out for 55 and Gates had no problems in knocking off the runs.

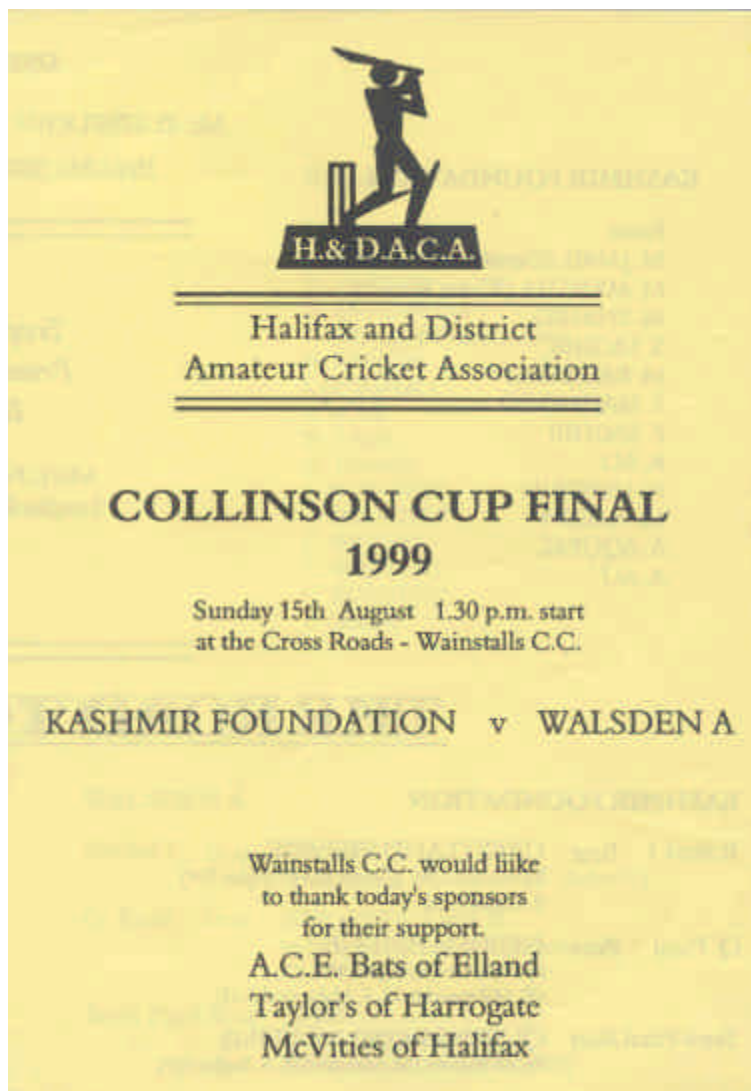

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 2001 - CLUB CONSTITUTION

### WAINSTALLS CRICKET CLUB. NAME, CONSTITUTION AND RULES WRITTEN 1986 REVISED 1990,1991,1992,1993,1994,1995,1996 2001.

1. The name of the Club shall be known as "Wainstalls Cricket Club".
2. The headquarters of the Club shall be Wainstalls Cricket Club, The Cross Roads, Wainstalla, Halifax, until such time that the Committee decide otherwise.
3. The aims of the Club shall be foster cricket and provide recreation for its members.
4. The Club shall consist of members and players duly approved by the Committee. Membership shall be open to all irrespective of age, gender, disability, race, ethnic origin, creed, colour, social status and sexual orientation.
5. The Club shall be controlled by duly elected Officials.
6. Three Trustees shall be elected and shall continue to serve until one of the following occurs - Resignation from Office, Leaving the Club, Death of a Trustee, Removal of a Trustee from Office.
7. The Officials of the Club shall consist of President, Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Team Captains and Trustees.
8. The President shall be elected annually by a simple majority at the Annual General Meeting.
9. The Committee consisting of President, Secretary, Treasurer, Trustees and a minimum of three members shall meet once a month to expedite Club affairs acting on behalf of the members of the Club.
10. A minimum of seven members entitled to vote shall form a quorum at the Annual General Meeting.
11. A person shall be entitled to vote at an Annual General Meeting providing he was either a player registered with the Club during the previous season and providing he was still registered with the Club at the end of the season, or an Official of the Club during the previous season.
12. The Committee shall have the power to co-opt at any time to fill a vacancy.
13. Each Official and Member shall have one vote at a General Meeting. The President shall have a casting vote in the event of a tie in addition to an ordinary vote.



14. The Secretary shall draw up the agenda and convene the meeting. He shall also keep minutes of the meeting, deal with any correspondence, carry out instructions given by the Committee and be responsible for player registration.
15. The Treasurer shall keep a record of all the Club's finances.
16. The teams shall be selected by a Committee comprising of the President of the Club as Chairman, 1st and 2nd Team Captains and Vice Captains.
17. The twelfth man for the first team if not required, shall automatically play for the second team. Any player not being available and not notifying the Club Officials will not be considered for selection until such time as they confirm they are available for selection.
18. Any situation arising not covered by existing rules will be resolved by the Committee, who shall deal with it as they see fit.

# END OF AN ERA

## 2005 – HALIFAX ASSOCIATION FOLDS

In and around 2003 there was talk of a merger between Wainstalls C.C. and another Halifax Association side, Queen's Road Muslims. This, however, came to nothing – as did talk of a merger between the Club and one or two other sides in the area.



Wainstalls' future was thrown into further doubt when the Halifax Association folded in 2005.
