1997 – SWITCH TO SIDDAL

When Siddal C.C. folded in 1995, West End looked into the possibility of upping sticks, and in 1997 formally moved to Park Lane.

The facilities were poor, and I remember one occasion on which it was snowing - and the players had to change in a caravan! We always wanted our own ground and the move to Siddal worked out well. We were now no longer reliant on the council and it actually worked out cheaper.'***

West End secured a 15-year lease on the Siddal ground at an annual rent of £250.

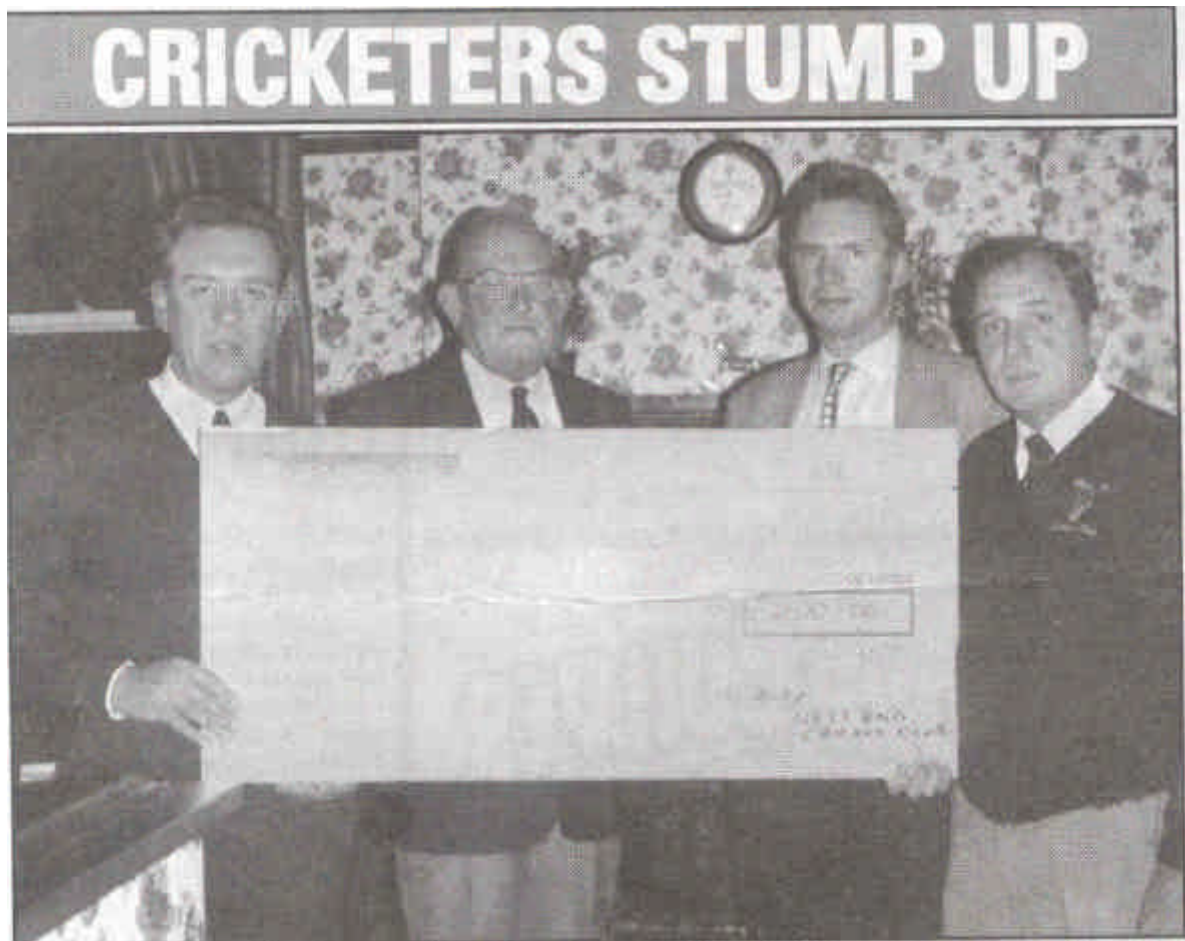


They also applied to join the Halifax Cricket League but were rejected.

Queen's Road Muslims ready to leave Association

Cup kings plan leagues switch

QUEEN'S Road Muslims completed a Collinson Cup hat-trick at Wainstalls yesterday and then announced that they hoped to quit the troubled Halifax Association for the Halifax League.

Skinner Scilar Hussain, who started the club in 1977, said the reason was the lack of a challenge in the Association.

That was something which had been all too apparent earlier in the afternoon as the champions crushed West End by 170 runs in a one-sided final.

Scilar said: "There is no competition for us in this league. There are only 10 teams and some of those are second teams. We want a day's cricket but sometimes we are finishing at 4.0."

He revealed that he had already approached the Halifax League and Muslims hoped to start off in the Sunday Section.

The big stumbling block to such a move is that Halifax League clubs must have their own grounds and Muslims currently use a council-owned pitch at Spring Hall, Halifax.

Scilar said there were two possible solutions. One was a merger with yesterday's final hosts Wainstalls, who last year were unsuccessful in an application to join the Halifax League for 2004. The other was to gain no agreement over the pitch on the site of the new school planned for Wellholer Park.

Queen's Road are also chasing a third successive league title, returning to the top on Saturday, and news of the star skip's possible departure is likely to fill Association officials with dismay.

League assistant secretary Naji Stokes has said that the league cannot afford to lose any more clubs or it will fold. Officials have invited works teams to take part in next year's Collinson Cup in the hope that they might enjoy the competition enough to enter a side in the Association.

They also introduced a Twenty20 Cup-style item for the league's top

second teams. West End and New Niding, as part of a double header at Wainstalls yesterday to encourage the players from those sides.

Some powerful batting from West End players Richard Cox and Nick Holinger, who took 21 runs off the first two overs, paved the way for a 98-run success for their side. But West End's first lead never had a prayer of making it a club double by winning the main event.

Julian Buddy won the toss but that was the limit of his success as Queen's Road Muslims made a mockery of the pre-match talk that they might be vulnerable against confident opponents.

Muslims opener Shafiqat Hussain and Hussain Akhtar put on 103 in stu-

pe quick time. Shafiqat reserved the goal for his first big score of the season, taking the most of the match award with 108.

His tally would no doubt have been many more but for a shoulder injury caused by a rising delivery which forced him to retire.

Hussain made a more reserved 52 but Tariq Mahmood plundered a brisk 90 to take the total spiralling to 254 for six, an impressive figure off 46 overs even allowing for the small ground.

West End's afternoon went from bad to worse when their top four batsmen were sent packing for single-figure scores before the score had reached 30.

Jamil Ahmed and Mohammed Hussain did the damage with speedy Saif Hussain unusually rickety.

Chris Kirby, Jamie Kenny and Steve Pascoe put in a few defiant strokes for West End before Tariq Mahmood scattered Adnan Adnan's attempts to polish off the West End innings for 84.

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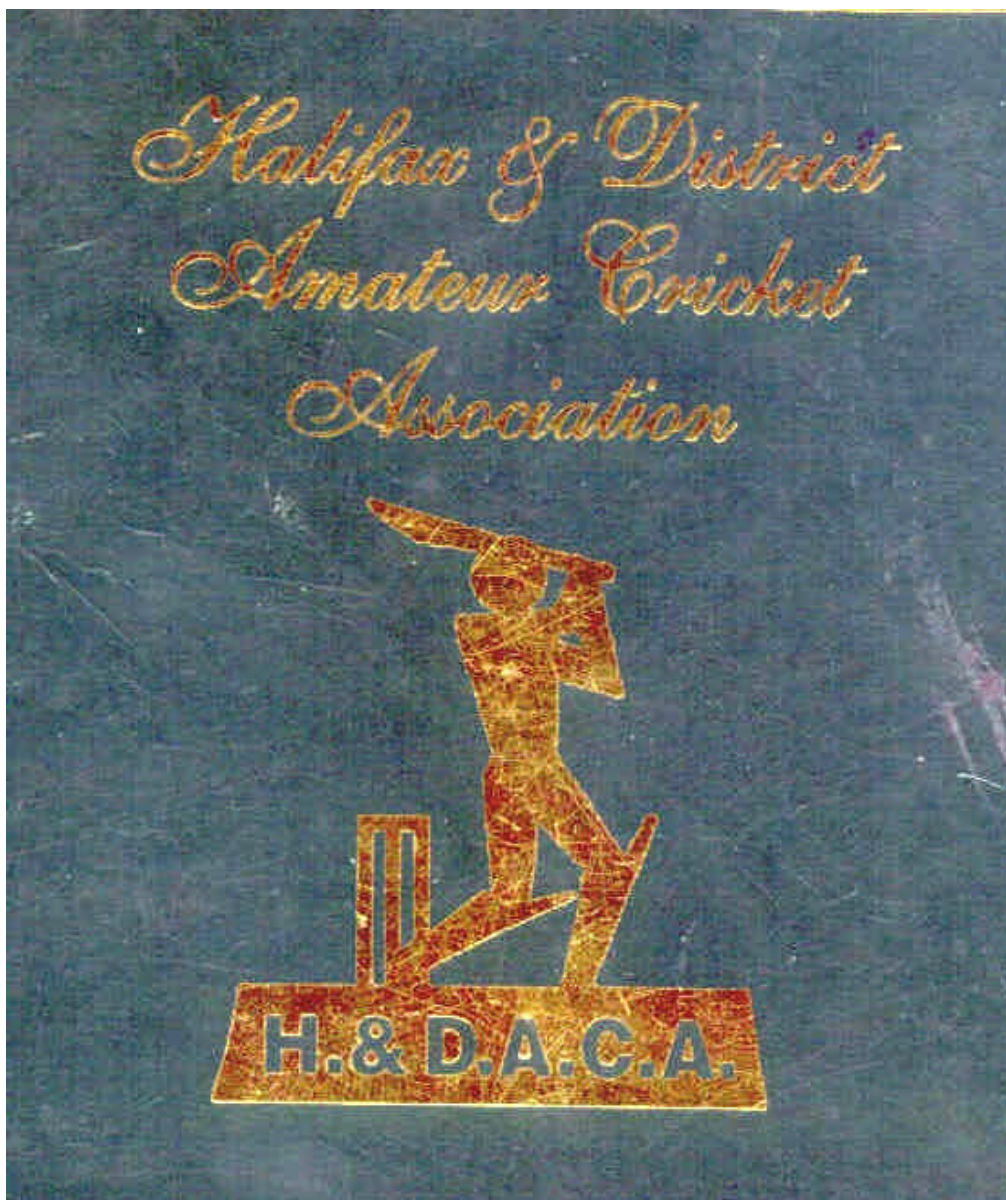

At the beginning of 2005 West End C.C. were dealt a huge blow. After much discussion at the AGM, the Halifax Association League was disbanded.

The withdrawal of Halifax Salem proved to be the catalyst.

Other clubs too were encountering difficulties in raising sufficient players for the forthcoming season.

Another major problem was caused by the work being undertaken on the council-owned playing fields at Spring Hall.

A new athletics track was being built, which meant that the cricket pitches would be unavailable for most of the 2005 season.

With no suitable alternative venue available, the four Association clubs that played at Spring Hall were effectively homeless.

The Association was no more.
