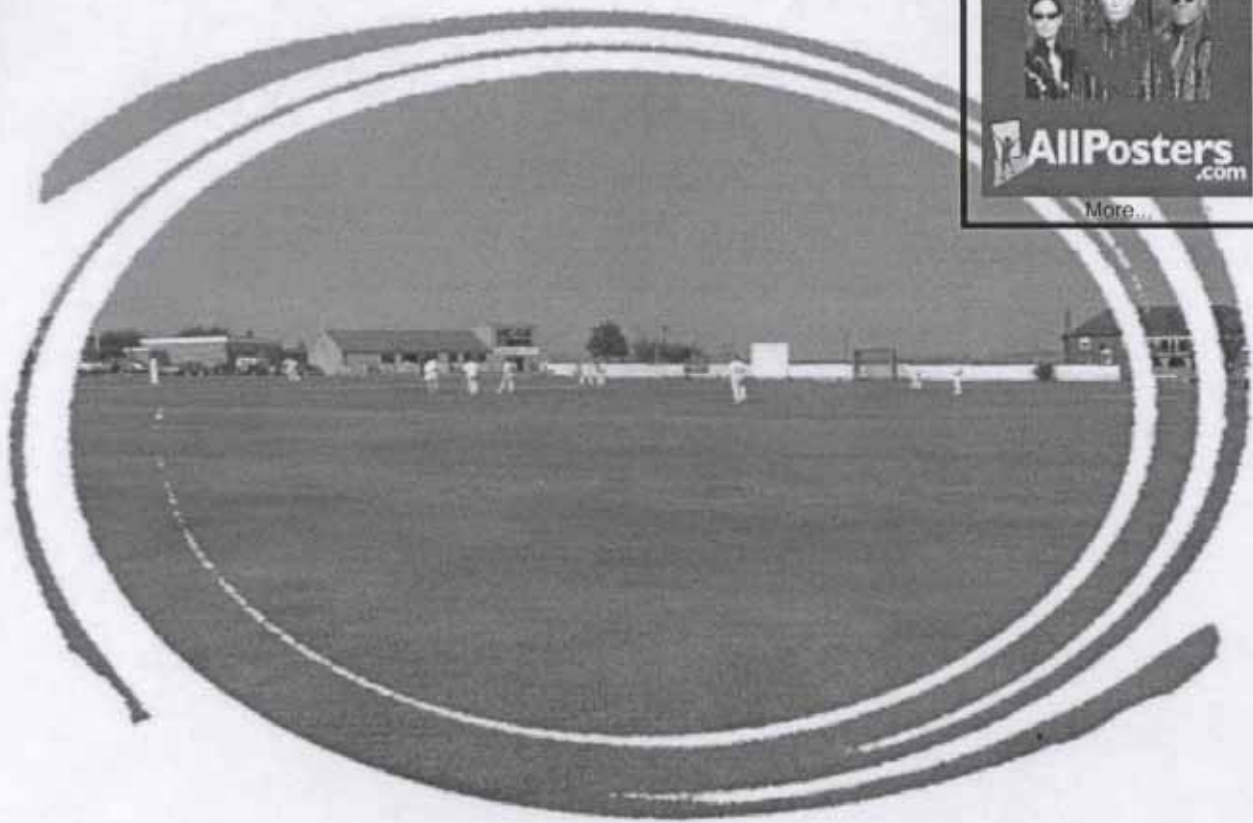


Playing Cricket in the Local Commu



Batley CC has played its cricket at Mount Pleasant for well over a hundred years. Situated in the heart of the Heavy Woolen District in West Yorkshire, it is an area steeped in the rich traditions of Yorkshire Cricket with dozens of clubs playing the game in the gritty style that has gained the county world wide renown.

Founded in 1863 Batley C.C. moved to its present location, at *University of Huddersfield* 0. Batley's most famous cricketer was undoubtedly *University of Huddersfield* an opening batsman who played through a complete innings for Yorkshire more than any other player. *University of Huddersfield* driving force behind Batley helping to found the Heavy Woollen Cricket League which was also well known as a *Methodist preacher*, and this in a team which was hard



Batley were successful in the early 1940's and again in the 1960's (John Hastings achieved the rare feat of taking a century in a Test innings at Gomersal.) The 1970's were lean years for Batley but the 1980's saw a revival in their fortunes, which culminated in the 1989 season when Batley became the only club ever to achieve a clean sweep in all four of the competitions which they entered :

- CYCL Division 1 Champions
- YCC Play Off Champions
- Heavy Woollen Cup Winners
- Jack Hampshire Cup Winners



(In addition, in the same season, Batley second XI won the Crowther Cup.)

As is the way with these things, this successful side broke up and eventually lean years followed, including relegation to Division 2. The cyclical nature of cricketing fortune was demonstrated again in the mid 1990's with arrival of Dale Burns as overseas professional and the gathering of a young and very talented side. Within two years Batley were promoted to Division 1 as Division 2 Champions and in 1996 finished as runners up in the top flight, with the future looking rosy.



The last three years however, have seen a steady decline in the club's fortunes, with relegation from the top flight last season, but there is still a desire from within the club to strive for future glories and though this year's first and second XI's are not the strongest in their respective divisions, the spirit throughout the club is second to none.

In 1919, following the catastrophe of the First World War, Batley won the Heavy Woollen Cup and record gate receipts of £300 were paid by 24,000 spectators who paid 3old pence each, over the course of a Saturday and the following three or four evenings. This was proof that with a small contribution from many local people great things could be achieved. All of the present members of Batley CC should take careful note of this.
