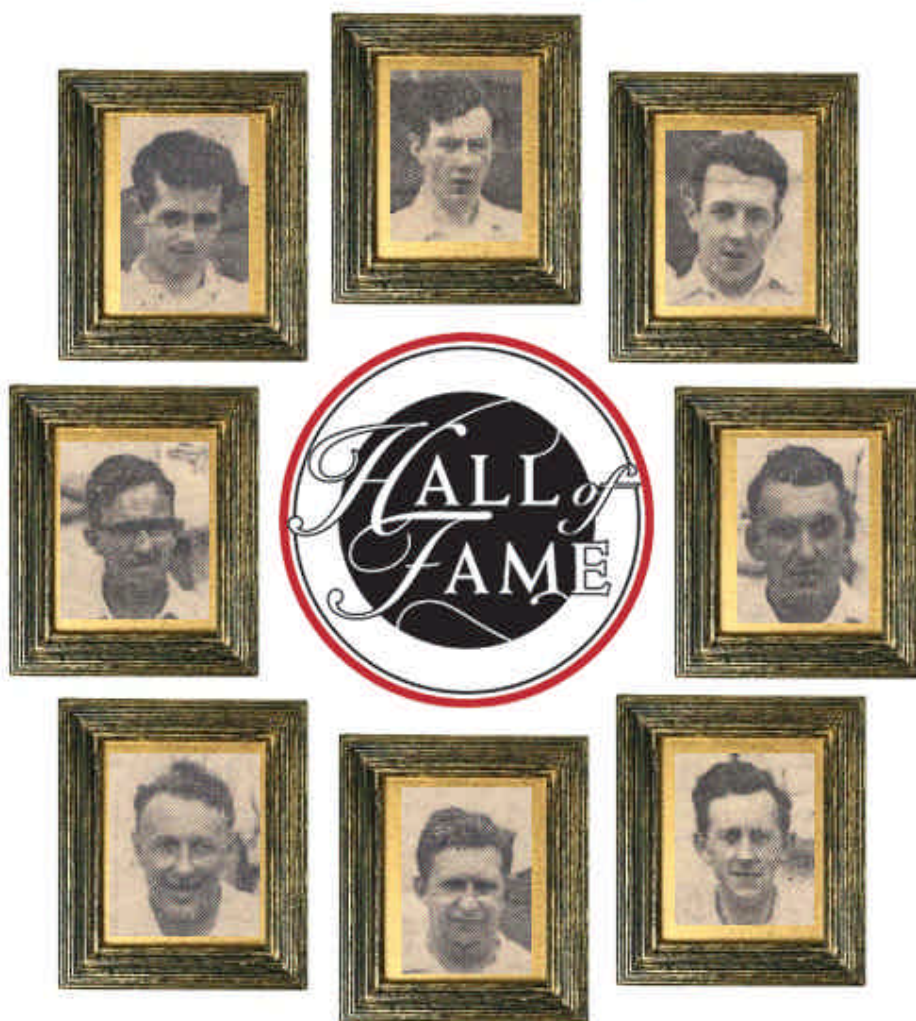

J. PARKER

J. Parker was a Club member in the last decade of the nineteenth century. Parker, with a batting average of 24.48, was top of the tree so far as the 1897 1st XI was concerned.

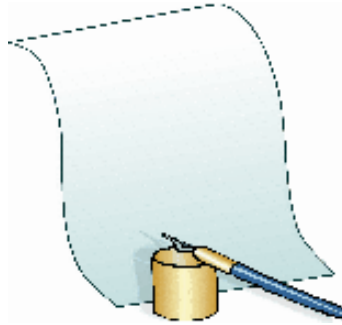


Mr Parker and Mr E. Batley worked nobly to help starting a church magazine in 1897. This was a significant contribution to the development of the church and Cricket Club.



E. BATLEY

E. Batley was the corresponding secretary of the Club in the late-1890s. He also helped to start the church magazine.



S. HARRISON

S. Harrison was an Upper Chapel member, who influenced the Club greatly. Mr Harrison played a significant part in the redevelopment of the Chapel Lane ground in the years following the Second World War.

Arthur Aspinall was the older brother of Geoff Aspinall. Arthur played semi-pro cricket in the Bradford League with Great Horton. In his late teens he was a prolific wicket-taker.



Ernest Aspinall was the third Aspinall brother.

SIMON WALKER

Simon Walker was a Carlinghow St. John's player before the merger of the two clubs. He was a committee man and player for Heckmondwike and Carlinghow United. He was a leading administrator.



BILLY ATKIN

Billy Atkin, a feared wicketkeeper, was one of the 'characters' in the history of the Club.

His sense of humour made him a legendary personality.

SUSAN COOPER

Susan Cooper was a treasured member of the Club. Her contribution will not be forgotten. Susan became involved in the Club at the age of 17 and took on the roles of tea lady and scorer.



Christine Crowther and **Mable Sykes** are two other remarkable Heckmondwike & Carlinghow United women, who have helped the Club enormously over the years.
