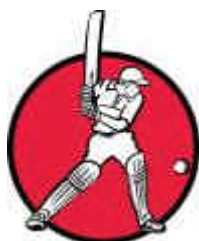

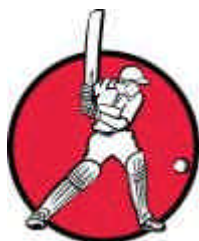

Battling batsman's celebration century

VETERAN Denby Dale cricketer Bas Lucas has another century to add to his tally of 100s over the years.

But it was a battling innings of a very special kind for Bas — he lost the sight of his right eye in a cricketing tragedy in 1980.

Not only that but his 10th Central League century came as Bas was nursing a broken finger and approaching his 54th birthday.

Bas' match-winning knock came in a second team game at

Crigglistone, near Wakefield, and completed a remarkable fight-back.

He said: "I've wanted that innings for years. But I have had to work very hard for it.

"Every day for weeks on end, I went out hitting a golf ball to try to get some co-ordination between hand and my remaining eye and I've lost count how many thousands and thousands of times I've bounced a tennis ball up against a fence to practice seeing and catching a moving ball.

"It took me a long time before I could catch it, but eventually I

did and then I carried on until I was able to pick it up every time."

Bas, of Claret Close, Penistone, lost the sight in his eye when he top-edged a delivery.

He vowed to continue playing until he again scored a century.

"Now I've scored it, I'd like to carry on playing and get another one," said Bas, the sales manager at South Yorkshire Home Improvements.

His score of 105 for the team he has served for 20 years came only two weeks after he broke his finger . . . playing cricket.
